Why Pick on Us?

We sincerely hope the statements contained herein will not be construed by the readers of THE WEEKLY REVIEW as being remarks that would signify our approval of gambling in any form. However, it can only be fairly well assumed that a great number of our readers became alarmed when they read of the invasion of slot machines into the very heart of our district, as described in a front page account of last Sunday's Detroit Free Press.

Their generous use of Sunday column space consumed 26 inches supplemented with a five column wide picture to substantiate their story. In relating the details of their noble "discovery," the Free Press let it be inferred that apparently Macomb County officials held little regard for the Governor's anti-gambling orders.

To us it seems that Macomb County appears to be the chief target for the Detroit newspapers' gambling stories. Just why they seem to find it so entertaining to write about our county all the time, when they could, if they wanted to, find sufficient material to write about every day in the week regarding the gambling in Detroit.

With a countless number of "bookies" operating seven days a week, and any number of other "joints" where they can locate crap games, black-jack, stud, and other forms of gambling flourishing in Detroit, the Free Press had to come out to Macomb County and expose the existence of four slot machines within forty feet of the Sheriff's sub-station at the Nine Mile Road and Van Dyke avenue last Saturday.

We are not supporting the presence of the slot machines in our district by relating their "discovery" but are registering a complaint against the frequent attacks Detroit newspapers make on Macomb County with regards to gambling.

The amount of gambling that takes place in Macomb County is so insignificant when compared to the amount taking place in Detroit that it makes us wonder why they even mention Macomb County.

The resources of THE WEEKLY REVIEW are so meager that for us to try to go into Detroit and photograph the many "joints" that have proximity to churches, schools, police stations, the newspaper offices, and other countless places, makes it a task we could not undertake.

We can only express a feeling of unfairness being displayed against our county officials, business men, and residents, by the Detroit Newspapers continually expounding the gambling situation in Macomb County.

Why don't they clean up Detroit? WHY PICK ON US?

Organize Township Civilian Defense Council

Earl Tallman To Head Local Organization

Li-Col. Harold A. Furlong, administrator of the Michigan State Council of Defense, yesterday notified Warren Township to proceed at once to the organization of civilian defense. The State Defense Council, constituted by act of the Michigan Legislature, informed the Township that detailed defense plans, coordinated with approved Army and Navy defense procedure would be forwarded at once to Earl Tallman, Township Supervisor, who was designated as the authority to proceed with organization and who will receive and issue official instructions for the district.

In response to these instructions Tallman last night conferred with representatives of the Township's School districts, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion Posts, the Canadian and Polish Legion, lady and law enforcement of local Red Cross leaders, members of the Warren Township Defense Reception, the Warren Township Branch Council of Social Agencies of Metropolitan Detroit, and representatives from the geographical sections of the Township.

As a result of this meeting plans are being formulated for a Township Civilian Defense Council whose members will be made up from representatives of the following groups:

Veteran's Groups: American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Canadian Legion, National Agencies: American Red Cross, Boy and Girl Scouts, National United Service Organizations.

Labor: A. F. of L., C. I. O. **Industrial and Mercantile Groups:** Representatives from the Township's Industries and Mercantile Establishments.

Religious Societies: Warren Township Physicians and Surgeons. **Social Agency Groups:** All Social Agencies integrated in the Warren Township Branch Council of Social Agencies.

Government Groups: School Board Superintendents, Law Enforcement, Public Safety, Utilities.

Other Improvements: Community Improvement Association, Township County Committee for Good Government.

Churches: Catholic and Protestant.

DEFENSE ROAD PLAN IS URGED

Seeking to have Nine and 13-Mile roads taken over as state trunk lines, so that Federal defense projects may be arranged, and also requesting completion of M-97 and a bridge across the Clinton river, the County Road Commission has an appointment with State High Commissioner G. Donald Kennedy in Lansing at 3:30 p. m. Wednesday.

Immediate completion of M-97, forming a by-pass around this city to the west, will be urged on Kennedy by the road commissioners. Gov. Murray D. Van Wagoner, when state highway commissioner, and Kennedy, since assuming that post, have discussed the project favorably on a number of occasions.

BUSCH CHOIR TO PRESENT CHRISTMAS CONCERT

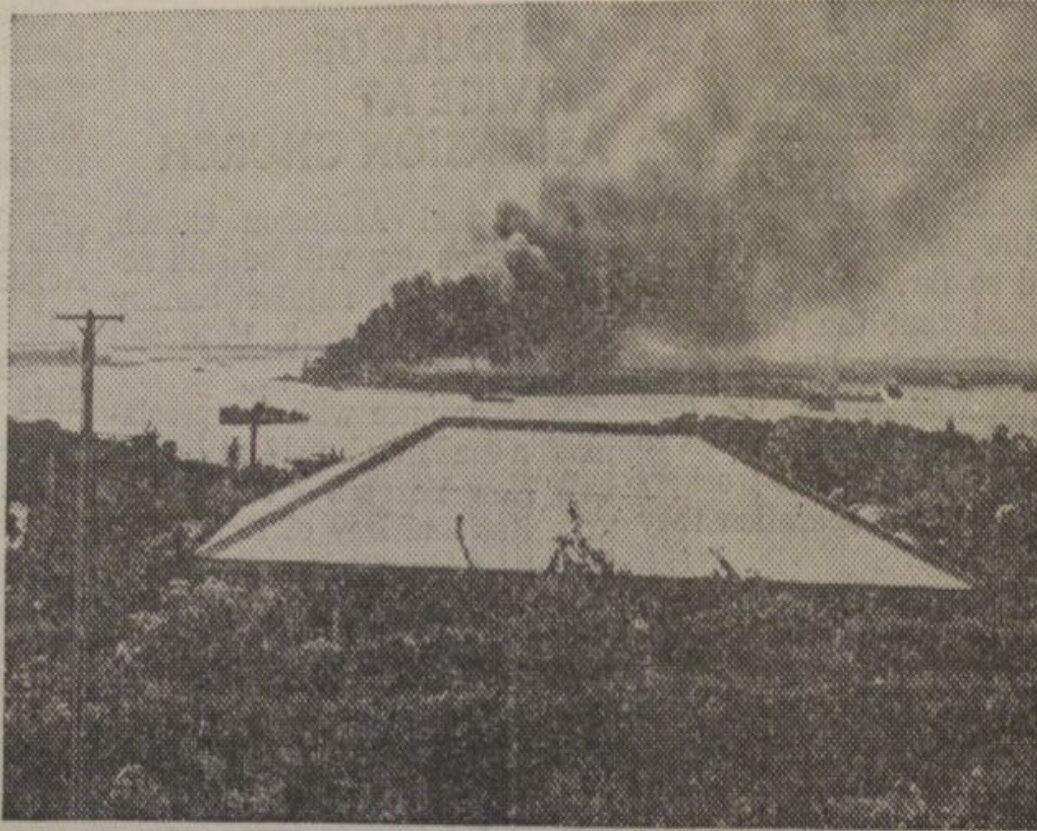
The Busch A Cappella Choir of Busch School will present a Christmas concert Thursday evening, December 12th at 8 o'clock in the Busch auditorium.

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Red Cross Seeking Blood Donors Here

The American Red Cross has issued a call for voluntary blood donors from the Detroit area. The call was issued by General Surgeon T. McIntire, Major General W. W. Wray, and Surgeon General C. W. Hays, they said.

A statement to Chairman H. Davis, they said, is a national emergency requirement that every necessary step be taken as soon as possible to insure the best medical service for the expanded armed forces.

The call is in order to insure the adequate medical service, the Red Cross has been requested to increase voluntary blood donors in a number of the larger cities in this country, to provide necessary equipment, to insure the fastest blood supply to a processing center, to arrange for the separating of the blood for storing the result in refrigerated rooms.

The call for the Van Dyke is 250.

The call for the Army and Navy has started the Red Cross to start the National Research Council to determine what will be the most suitable project ever attempted.

Under the direction of Dr. W. H. W. Wray, appointed by the National Research Council and Mrs. W. H. W. Wray, appointed by the American Red Cross, the Detroit chapter has sent out a call for blood donors.

TWO ARE DEAD IN ACCIDENTS OVER HOLIDAY

A Roseville woman and a nine-year-old Detroit boy were killed in traffic accidents Thursday, the first fatalities in Macomb County in 1942. The fatal accidents came after the county's 1941 highway death toll has reached an all-time record of 90.

According to deputies Potts was driving west on the Thirteen Mile road and failed to stop for Hoover car. His car collided with a car driven by Russell T. Dale, 21, of 22719 Schoonher road, Warren Township.

Della Noble, 15, of 14241 Knox avenue, East Detroit, and Clarence Jock, 19, of 19708 Mack avenue, Detroit, were injured in the crash.

Officers said Dale appeared too intoxicated to make a statement. Both drivers face reckless driving charges and may be charged with more serious offenses.

The Olezak boy died when a car driven by his father, Joseph Olezak, 34, of 8148 Brentwood avenue, Detroit, left the highway on Van Dyke a mile north of Utica Thursday morning and struck a tree. The boy's mother, Anna Olezak, 31, was also injured. The boy died in St. Joseph hospital Thursday night.

MEN 20 TO 44 TO REGISTER FEBRUARY 16

Washington, D.C. — President Roosevelt, late last week set Feb. 16 as the date for registration of men between the ages of 20 and 44, inclusive.

Although recent changes in the selective service act permit registration of men from 18 through 64, the President called for the registration now of only those citi...
